

“Europeans for democracy”



Gisela Stuart has been the Labour Member of Parliament for Birmingham Edgbaston since 1997. Gisela is a former Minister and was also a Praesidium Member and UK Parliamentary Representative on the Convention on the Future of Europe, which drew up the EU Constitution. This experience is chronicled in the pamphlet *'The Making of Europe's Constitution'*, which Gisela wrote for the Fabian Society. As well as being editor of Parliament's political weekly *'The House Magazine'*, Gisela has been a leading member of the Foreign Affairs Committee since July 2001 and is also Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on International and Transatlantic Security.



Dr. Jochen Bittner is the European and Nato Correspondent with the German newsweekly Die Zeit. Prior to his post in Brussels, he was editor of the political board of Die Zeit in the newspaper's Hamburg head office. Since 2001, he has had a special focus on terrorism, legal politics, defence and intelligence affairs. Dr. Bittner studied Law and Philosophy and holds a PhD in Legal Philosophy from the University of Kiel. Between 1998 and 1999 he lived in Belfast, where he investigated the semi-secret judicial system of the IRA. His book publications include: *Ein unperfekter Frieden - Die IRA auf dem Weg vom Mythos zur Mafia*, 2001, and *Beruf Terrorist - Ein Tagebuch der neuen Weltunordnung*, 2006.



Svetla Kostadinova is the Executive Director of the non-profit Institute for Market Economics (IME) in Bulgaria, the first and oldest independent economic policy think tank in Bulgaria. IME's mission is to elaborate and advocate market-based solutions for reform in Bulgaria and the region. In the last eight years, Ms Kostadinova has published hundreds of articles and participated in numerous TV and radio shows on issues relating to the Bulgarian and Central-East European transitions to market economies and democracy. She is a member of the Bulgarian Macroeconomic Association and in 2007, joined the Bulgarian *Euro Team*, organised by the European Commission.



Dr. Erik Lakomaa is a political consultant known for his role as strategist for the No campaign in the 2003 Swedish referendum on the euro. In 2005 he was awarded the *Rising Star Award* as the best political consultant under 40 outside the United States. Dr. Lakomaa begun his career as an editorial writer for Swedish daily newspaper Svenska Dagbladet, and also edited the libertarian magazine Nyliberalen. In 2004 he founded the first political consultancy in Sweden. Dr. Lakomaa holds an MSc and a PhD from Stockholm School of Economics where he also holds a position as assistant professor at the Institution for Marketing and Strategy.



Roland Vaubel is Professor of Economics at the University of Mannheim, Germany. He received a B.A. in Philosophy, Politics and Economics from the University of Oxford, an M.A. from Columbia University, New York, and a doctorate from the University of Kiel, Germany. He has been Professor of Economics at Erasmus University Rotterdam and Visiting Professor of International Economics at the University of Chicago (Graduate School of Business). He is a member of the Advisory Council

to the German Federal Ministry of Economics and Technology. He is associate editor of the Review of International Organisations and author of "The European Institutions as an Interest Group: The Dynamics of Ever Closer Union", Institute of Economic Affairs, London 2009.



Eline van den Broek is a political scientist and a journalist. After her studies in law, economics and political science, Eline specialised in healthcare systems and pharmaceutical policy in different European countries. She has published numerous reports and opinion editorials for think tanks across Europe. From 2006 to 2008, Eline worked in the European Parliament as a political advisor on internal market issues, focusing on the issue of cross border health services. In 2005, Eline ran the "No campaign" against the EU Constitution in The Netherlands. With 62% voting against the Treaty in the

Netherlands, she was shocked that Dutch politicians decided to sign the Lisbon Treaty without holding a new referendum.
